Georgia Nutrition Assistance Program (GNAP)

What is the Georgia Nutrition Assistance Program (GNAP)?

- Georgia General Assembly and Department of Human Services (DHS) offer grant funding to Georgia food banks to provide food assistance to eligible families with children.
- This funding utilizes federal TANF (Temporary Assistance For Needy Families) dollars and as such is subject to those program provisions.
- The focus of the program is to purchase and distribute nutritious foods to Georgia families with children that participate in TANF or are at risk of TANF eligibility.
- This service assists families during periods of financial crisis and transition out of crisis to maintain their households and keeps families intact.





What's new with GNAP?

- GNAP food can now only be distributed to our neighbors during a set 4month distribution window.
- Per DHS this allows the program to stay in compliance with changes in the federal TANF law that funds GNAP and governs how often families can receive services.
- GNAP product will only be available in ACFB inventory 4 months out of the year.
- This year that window is March 2024–June 2024
- All GNAP product must be ordered and distributed out of Food Bank and partner agency inventories between March 1 – June 30

ACFB's Role In GNAP

ACFB Role in GNAP

- Purchase and distribute nutritious foods to provide continuing support to eligible families with children.
- Works with partner agencies to identify and distribute GNAP food to eligible families with children
- Ensure distribution of GNAP food happens within the 4-month distribution period. No food purchased with GNAP funds may be distributed to households outside the four-month period selected by each food bank.
- At the end of the 4-month distribution period, the Food Bank will verify that all GNAP food inventory has been fully distributed to households within the 4-month distribution period.

Examples of Food that might be Available

- Canned Tuna & Chicken
- Pop-Top Canned Meals (Ravioli, Lasagna, Spaghetti, etc..)
- Canned Fruit
- Beef, Chicken, and Turkey Chubs

- Rice (Brown, White, Yellow)
- Dry Beans (Black Lentils, Pinto, & Navy)
- Canned Vegetables (Corn, Green Beans, Peas, Mustard Greens)

This is not a shopping list. Items are not guaranteed to be stock.

Partner Agency Role In GNAP

Which Agencies Are Eligible?

Only Partner Agencies that serve children may participate in the GNAP program. These include:

- Food Pantries
- Childcare Centers
- After-School Programs
- Family Shelters
- Group Homes For Children
- Schools

Partner Agencies that do not serve children will not be able to participate in the GNAP program.

Partner Agency Role

Identify

- Identify Families Eligible to receive GNAP food.
- Low-income families with children under age 18, and children age 18 and attending school full-time.

Distribute

• <u>Distribute all GNAP food to eligible</u> <u>families within the 4-month</u> <u>distribution period</u>.

Report

• Report monthly on the number of families served, their eligibility category, pounds of GNAP distributed and the remaining GNAP food in inventory. Which Families Are Eligible At Food Pantries?

- Only households with minor children living in the home can receive GNAP.
 - A minor is considered a child under age 18, and children age 18 and attending school full-time.
- A family must fall into one of the following categories to qualify for GNAP:
 - At-risk Families
 - Families receiving TANF Transitional services
 - Families currently enrolled in TANF
- Neighbors will self-declare their eligibility by either
 - A) affirming they currently receive TANF cash assistance,
 - B) affirming they currently receive TANF transitional services
 - C) affirming they meet one of the At-Risk conditions
- Adults without children cannot receive GNAP foods.

The vast majority of families you serve will be in the "At-Risk" category.

This should be reflected in the records and reports you compile and submit to the Food Bank Georgia DHS identifies At-Risk families as having household income below 200% of the federal poverty line. You can identify these families by asking them if they meet at least one of the At-Risk qualifying conditions.

At-Risk qualifying conditions:

- They are a current SNAP recipient.
- They receive USDA / TEFAP commodities.
- They are enrolled in Medicaid.
- Public housing resident or Section 8 tenant.
- Children who participate in the free or reduced-price school meal program.
- They earn hourly wages at \$8 per hour or less.
- They are enrolled in the WIC program.
- They receive state unemployment wage benefits.



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How To Identify TANF Enrolled Families

Families who participate in the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) Program receive monthly cash assistance from the government.

To help a family know if they are enrolled in TANF you can ask if they have received one of the following:

- TANF EBT card
- TANF eligibility letter from DFCS

Assistance for Needy Families

Because of the small number of families participating in TANF, very few of your GNAP families will qualify for GNAP as TANF recipients.

How to Identify TANF Transitional Families

After the cash assistance period, a family on TANF may be given additional support services.

TANF Transitional families may receive the following services for a short length of additional time:

- Childcare vouchers
- Transportation assistance
- Job skills classes
- Work uniforms

TANF Transitional families will still have:

- TANF EBT card
- TANF eligibility letter from DFCS

Even fewer families receive TANF transitional services so this will be a very small number of families

What About Record Keeping for Food Pantries?



There are two separate reports on E-Harvest used to report GNAP food distribution:

1st Report: GNAP Households Report

- Indicate the number of households receiving GNAP
- Capture how the household is eligible for GNAP (TANF, TANF Transitional, or At-risk)
- The total # of households served by each category are submitted to the State Monthly. Accurate reporting is very important to maintain funding. Please be sure to accurately record the number of households in the correct fields.

2nd Report: GNAP On Hand Report

• Indicate the # of lbs. of GNAP food distributed that month and the # of lbs. of GNAP food still on hand on the last day of the month.

Reports are due by the 9th day of each month (Ex. March report is due on April 9th)

Day of GNAP Distribution RECAP:

Received GNAP:

- Households with children living in the home. (17yrs or younger or 18yrs old still in school)
- Partners serving neighbors with children.



On premise meal programs that do not serve children will not be able to receive GNAP commodities.

Not Eligible for GNAP:

Households that DO NOT have children living in the home.



GNAP is a program for agencies that serve children...

All GNAP Food must be distributed within the 4-month ACFB GNAP distribution period to eligible families with children.

A family must fall into one of three categories to qualify for GNAP: TANF, TANF transitional or At-Risk.

Accurate distribution and Inventory numbers must be reported by the 9th each month.

Next Steps & Reminders

- Review, sign and return GNAP MOU before your next delivery.
- Train volunteers on process for qualifying families
 - Feel free to print pg. 16-18 to have on hand during distribution for volunteers.
- Be sure to look at your invoice to see which items are labeled NICE/GNAP *
 If you do not have these items you do not have to complete the GNAP
 column on the sign-in sheet however, you will still have to complete the
 GNAP Report for the month.
- Complete monthly reports by the 9th of each month!
